# 30 YEARS OF 9-1-1 IN WILL COUNTY



County Executive Bertino-Tarrant and the Will County Board recognized the 30th anniversary of the county's Emergency Telephone System Board (ETSB) at the Dec. 15th Board meeting. The ETSB was the first unified 9-1-1 system for the county, replacing 16 separate systems managed by local governments.

Creating a unified system made it easier for telecommunications staff to save more lives and to increase the public's confidence int he local emergency response system. The current system serves approximately 697,000 residents and visitors to Will County. In 2021, the system has answered 327,000 calls for service - 27,000 a month. Thank you to front-line telecommunicators for your dedication to service and our residents!

### WARMING CENTERS IN WILL COUNTY

With cold weather expected to hit Northern Illinois hard soon, communities throughout Will County have made Warming Centers available to the public.

There are warming centers available in almost every municipality in the county, including in village halls, fire stations, libraries, or other public meeting sites. Since many of these locations are open upon request, residents should contact the shelter to ensure availability.

The Will County Emergency Management Agency and the GIS Division maintain a list and interactive map to help residents find access to the nearest center.

### IN THE NEWS WILL COUNTY INCREASES FOCUS ON ATTRACTING GREEN INDUSTRIES

Will County is increasing it's focus on attracting green industries to the local economy, putting local communities at the forefront of the clean jobs revolution. County-wide elected leaders and local stakeholders have been working on several initiatives to attract the clean energy industry, including energy storage and transportation.

A significant example is the Will County Board recently voting to allow for battery energy storage facilities to open in unincorporated areas, empowering a trending clean energy industry to grow in Will County. Battery energy storage facilities store energy produced by renewable energy sources during periods of low-cost or over-production, to be later distributed to community electric grids when there is an increased need for power.

This zoning amendment makes Will County one of the first local governments in Illinois to allow for these facilities. Companies specializing in energy storage are projected to grow following the 2021 State of Illinois Climate & Equitable Jobs Act, which calls for the state to move towards 100% clean energy by the year 2050. The State of Illinois has also initiated a Coal-to-Solar Energy Storage Grants Program to provide incentives for companies to install energy storage facilities at the sites of former coal plants.
