Capital Projects Update: "Pardon Our Dust"

Our Facilities Department's Capital Programming Team has been hard at work with various large-scale building projects that are nearing completion. Here's a brief update on the progress of some of the most high-profile projects:

Old Courthouse Demolition – If you've driven through downtown Joliet, you may have noticed that the demolition of the Old Will County Courthouse is over halfway complete. Demolition of the structure is scheduled to be completed in April and the site will be fully clear and restored by July. The County Executive Office is in conversations with the City of Joliet to determine how this future open space can best serve residents while the long-term plans for the site are decided.

New Home for the CAC – The Children's Advocacy Center has moved into their new and improved home on Cedarwood Drive in Crest Hill. A converted daycare center, this new space will create a more welcoming environment for the CAC's important work of supporting victims of child abuse. County leaders will be cutting the ribbon on the new building in early April!

ADF Roof Replacement – A large-scale roof replacement project is in progress at the Will County Sheriff's Adult Detention Facility, built in 1989. This project will help ensure the long-term safety and viability of the facility. Will County is using this project as an opportunity to recycle existing materials, by using the existing stone roofing material for use by Will County DOT on various roadway maintenance projects.



Will County Accepting Community Development and Housing Grants

The Will County Community Development Division has opened applications for local governments, community organizations, and developers to apply for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME) Consortium funds.

All projects and programs must be in low-moderate income areas or serve low-moderate income households. Applications are available for community services, capital improvements, housing services, rental projects, and homebuyer projects. Last year, Will County received \$3.2 million for CDBG and HOME projects that benefited local communities. The exact total for this program year has yet to be determined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Applications are due by April 15, 2024 at 11:59 PM. Will County will be hosting a technical assistance workshop in hybrid format to assist potential applicants (both in-person and virtual) on April 3, 2024 from 9:00 AM until 12:30 PM in the County Board Room at 302 N. Chicago St., Joliet.
